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

Carousel

Music by Richard Rodgers Book and Lyrics by Oscar Hammerstein Original dances by Agnes de Mille

When Rodgers and Hammerstein's musical *Carousel* opened on April 19th 1945 at New York's Majestic Theatre, their smash hit *Oklahoma* was still playing to packed houses a few steps across West 44th street at the St. James Theatre.

Carousel was based on Ferenc Molnar's play Liliom. As with Oklahoma the idea for the musical was suggested by Teresa Helburn of New Yorks Theatre Guild. Rodgers and Hammerstein moved the original location of Molnar's plot from Budapest to New England in the 1870s and injected a strong element of hope to Molnar's deeply tragic story.

Carousel is rich in well loved songs, June Is Bustin' Out All Over, If I Loved You, Mr Snow and the popular hymn You'll Never Walk Alone. Lyricist Oscar Hammerstein laboured for weeks on the words of the wonderful 'Soliloquy' for the show. Amazingly, Richard Rodgers scored the piece in just two hours!

The original broadway production was directed by Rouben Mamoulian and choreographed by Agnes de Mille, the same team the Theatre Guild used on *Oklahoma*. The show starred largely unknown talents, John Raitt, Jan Clayton, Murvyn Vye, Jean Darling and Bambi Linn from *Oklahoma*.

In 1956 a hugely successful film version of Carousel was shot on location in Boothbay Harbor. The film starred Shirley Jones and Gordon MacRea. A largely fogotten fact is that Gordon MacRea's role was meant to be played by Frank Sinatra who walked off the film a few days into the production over a row about shooting every scene twice! — once in 55mm and again in 33mm cinemascope.




Julia Rufey - Director

Looking back

Ali, our excellent Publicity Officer, asked me to write something for the programme. I thought I'd give you a bit of background to ELODS history and as ELODS' longest serving acting member I feel reasonably well placed to do so.

The Company produced its first show in 1953 (well before my time!) with Trial by Jury and continued with a programme of various Gilbert and Sullivan performances until 1961 when they ventured into a production of Gypsy Baron. From then there was a varied programme of G & S and light opera classics.

Back in 1972 when I joined ELODS for their production of Brigadoon we performed at what was then known as the Intimate Theatre, Palmers Green. What a thrill, working in a real theatre with such a history. Oh the joys of cramped dressing rooms down some pretty steep stairs, having make-up professionally done under the stage and of course braving the elements to make an entrance from the opposite side of the stage.

During our time at the Intimate we experienced bouncing scenery and bouncing members of the cast, and a very rapidly sinking sun with a valiant cast member who completed the scene with real blood trickling down from a gash on his head (No fake stuff for ELODS!).

1989 saw the company move their productions to the Millfield Theatre following the closure of the Intimate. What a difference - a brand new custom built theatre complete with portacabins in the car park for chorus dressing rooms - there only being three principal sized dressing rooms within the theatre itself. Oh how we miss those cold rainy nights in November running from the portacabins to the stage door (even more so in scanty costumes!) But Millfield improved and built extra dressing rooms - LUXURY! But still we had our 'experiences' - not least the time that a runaway bed, complete with its three occupants, ended up with one corner in the orchestra pit - thanks to the support of the member of the orchestra who valiantly shoved the bed back on stage, the only injury we sustained was a slightly crumpled trombone!

2005 saw ELODS move to Wyllyotts and how glad we are that we did! Three shows in, I think we can say that we've arrived. I must express our thanks to everyone connected with Wyllyotts and you the audience for your fantastic support. It's great to be able to say that we feel like we're at home in Potters Bar.

When I started this, I thought it was going to be difficult to find something to say but I'm already at version 5 with too many cuts to count! Maybe they'll let me write again some time in the future because I haven't even started yet. But before we go I must tell you one story about the first time we performed Carousel.

During the ballet we all displayed our perfect 'fishdives' and elaborate lifts. When the time came for the carnival dancers to exit, the boys carried their partners off stage with great effect apart from the one who reversed into the stage left flat leaving his partner with a leg on each side! I mention no names, but you know who you are!

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

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
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
