THE STORY

It is May Day in the reign of Good Queen Bess. In a background of gaiety and fun surrounding the newly-crowned May Queen, her suitors, and a certain Walter Wilkins and his companion (both players in Shakespeare's Company) our story unfolds—

Sir Walter Raleigh, Queen Elizabeth's earnest favourite, has been indiscreet enough to fall in love with the Queen's maid in waiting—Bessie Throckmorton, who returns his love. The Earl of Essex seeks to turn this fact to his advantage. By showing a letter (written in Sir Walter's hand to Bessie and found by a wild forest girl called Jill-All-Alone) Essex hopes to gain Elizabeth for himself, but underestimates the Queen's jealousy so that Bessie and even Jill are in danger of losing their lives and Sir Walter banishment.

However, by playing on Elizabeth's conscience Essex conjures up a plot to stage the Legend of "Herne the Hunter" in the Forest. The Legend says that a monarch only sees the ghost of Herne when he or she is contemplating a crime. With the aid of Wilkins he persuades the Queen to rest by Herne's oak while Long Tom appears dressed in an old deerskin to assume "Herne the Hunter." Elizabeth is so shocked she pardons Raleigh, Bessie and Jill.

The curtain falls on more May Day celebrations with our lovers Raleigh and Bessie free to marry and Essex free . . . to marry a Queen?
