#### SYNOPSIS

Lighting

Just after the turn of the century—Oklahoma is still a territory but is about to become a state. The curtain opens onto the back of Laurey Williams' farmhouse early one beautiful morning. Aunt Eller is seated peacefully churning butter, as across the meadow the sound of song sung by Curly McLain. He is in love with Laurey and has come to ask her to the Box Social. As Curly is so fresh and sure of himself, Laurey tells him she has promised to go with Jud Fry, the farm's hired hand and a very surly man. Will Parker, a young cowboy in love with Ado Annie Carnes, returns from Kansas City: his arrival is somewhat ill-timed as far as Annie is concerned as she is having a fine old time with a peddler named Ali Hakim. The Company arrives at Aunt Eller's invitation to rest before the party that evening. Curly still tries to persuade Laurey to change her mind but she refuses — Curly goes off to see Jud Fry, not knowing that Laurey is too afraid of the hired hand to go back on her promise. Act I closes with Laurey's tormented dream about her real feelings for Curly and her fear of Jud.

Act II begins at the Skidmore Ranch where the Box Social is in full swing. Ali Hakim, now unwillingly engaged to Ado Annie, tries to ensure Will Parker's re-instatement as Annie's intended. At the Box Social all the girls' picnic hampers are auctioned to obtain money for the school house. The last hamper is Laureys and a tense scene builds up during the bidding between Jud and Curly. After unsuccessfully trying to kill Curly, Jud manages to get Laurey alone and press his unwanted attention on her: she overcomes her fear of him and sacks him. Curly finds her and shyly proposes to her. They are married three weeks later but, at the wedding party, Jud arrives and is killed in a fight with Curly when he falls on his own knife. Curly is exonerated from blame and the curtain closes as the couple are given a rousing send-off on their honeymoon.
