## THE STORY

Act I. The scene is set in the courtyard of Ko-Ko's palace in Titipu. The son of the Mikado appears disguised as a wandering minstrel and masquerading under the name of Nanki-Poo. He has come to look for Yum-Yum, the girl he adores. However, he is very depressed to hear that Yum-Yum is to marry her guardian that very afternoon,

Ko-Ko appears followed by his bride-elect and her sisters Pisti-Sing and Peop-Bo. Nanki-Poo reveals his real identity to Yum-Yum, also the reason for his disguise. He has fled his father's court because an elderly lady named Katisha has misconstrued his "customary affability into expressions of affection" and claimed him in marriage under his father's law.

Pish-Tush now appears bearing a letter to Ko-Ko from the Mikado, which states that no executions have taken place in Titipu for a year, and decrees that unless somebody is beheaded within a month, the pest of Lord High Executioner shall be abolished and the city reduced to the rank of a village. Ko-Ko decides he must execute somebody at once—but who? Then Nanki-Poo appears bent on committing sucide because Yum-Yum is to marry Ko-Ko. A compromise is arranged whereby Nanki-Poo will submit to execution in a month if Ko-Ko allows him to marry Yum-Yum that very afternoon.

Suddenly Katisha appears and claims her "perjured lover Nanki-Poo." but is thwarted by the assembled company, who take no heed of her threats of vengeance.

Act II. Yum-Ywm is being prepared for her wedding but her two sisters remind her that it is only for a month and Nanki-Poo and Pish Tush discover her in tears. Ko-Ko arrives with the disclosure that when a married man is beheaded, his wife has to be buried alive. On top of this they learn that the Mikado is approaching the city to see if his orders have been carried out, so Ko-Ko hurriedly sets a plot.

Ko-Ko. Pitt-Sing and Pooh-Bah then describe to the Mikado the "execution" in detail, but it appears that the Mikado is really looking for his son, known as Nanki-Poo. Katisha discovers that this name appears on the death certificate, so the Mikado orders three lingering deaths for the conspirators—but after lunch.

After the Royal Party's exit, Ko-Ko decides that the heir apparent must come to life again. Nanki-Poo states that Katisha will be infuriated when she learns the truth, so he suggests that Ko-Ko must marry her. Ko-Ko unwillingly agrees and woos Katisha with the rate of a little tom-tit who died of unrequited love.

The Mikado returns for the executions, but Katisha begs mercy for them. Nanki-Poo and Yum-Yum re-appear, and Ko-Ko furnishes everybody with an ingenious explanation, and all ends happily.
